#### 25 **Xenophobic attacks** – are migrants the only victims? The data is from: (1) a survey of 1,567 informal sector entrepreneurs in Gauteng and (2) the 2013 GCRO QoL III survey which interviewed 27,490 people in Gauteng

Cross border migrants in the informal sector are often the target of xenophobic attacks. Attacking people for who they are is wrong. It is also shortsighted when the same people contribute to our economy. These data identify some of the ways that cross border migrant entrepreneurs contribute to the South African economy.

We need to stop assuming that the informal sector is dominated by people from beyond South Africa's borders. Of the 1,979 respondents who owned businesses in the informal sector in the 2013 GCRO QoL III survey:

#### 54% had been born in Gauteng

28% had moved to Gauteng from elsewhere in South Africa 18% had moved to Gauteng from another country





### Paying rent to South Africans

Cross border migrant entrepreneurs contribute to South African households by paying rent:

## 28%

of migrants rent premises from South African individuals or companies (10% of South Africans did the same)

# 54%

of South African informal sector entrepreneurs interviewed rented premises to migrant entrepreneurs

Cross border migrants (58%) are more likely than South Africans (29%) to pay more than R1,000 per month.

Migrant entrepreneurs are often accused of avoiding tax but **75%** of cross border migrants and **84%** of South Africans interviewed earned under the SARS personal income and small business tax thresholds.

Tax and the formal sector



VAT and other taxes are paid by the majority of entrepreneurs regardless of nationality as they use formal sector outlets to source the supplies for their businesses.
